All about artificial intelligence

Why is everyone talking about artificial intelligence?

Artificial Intelligence, or AI, is becoming a more regular part of our daily lives, making many tasks easier and quicker. If you've been curious about what AI is, you're not alone. Think of AI as a computer program that learns from information it already has and uses that information to solve problems and create materials. Just like we learn from our experiences, AI learns from the information it's given and the questions (or prompts) it's asked.

You encounter Al in things like your phone's voice assistant, which can answer questions or set reminders. It's behind the suggestions you get on streaming services, recommending shows you might like. Al also works in chatbots on websites and generative Al tools that create written, audio, or visual content

Will AI impact my child's learning?

As Al is becoming more common, you may have questions about how Al will impact your child in and out of school. Al may or may not be used in your child's classroom. It's okay to be curious (or uncertain) about changes in technology. It's also important to ask questions about these changes to help you and your child understand how they might impact learning. The good news is that the skills being taught in BC classrooms today are designed to prepare all students with the tools they need to thrive both today and in a future where Al-related skills may be important in many jobs.

As technology changes, students must learn the skills to keep up. The BC curriculum helps students learn the competencies and digital skills they need for today's world. BC's curriculum also teaches the Core Competencies, which are the thinking, personal, and social skills your child needs to ensure that they use technology safely and responsibly. What your child learns today will ensure that they have skills for the future, like digital literacy, critical thinking, and problem-solving.

Al terms to know:

- Algorithms are like a recipe for a computer. They provide a step-by-step guide for computers, telling them exactly what to do to solve a problem or complete a task.
- Artificial intelligence (AI) is a digital tool that uses data to learn, solve problems, and make decisions — things that usually only people can do.
- Bias in AI is when the computer makes inaccurate or unfair choices because it learned from incomplete data. It's like learning to play a game but with only some of the rules.
- Data privacy is keeping your personal information safe online from others who shouldn't see it.
- Digital literacy is the ability to use technology and the internet wisely. It's having the skills to access, understand, evaluate, and share information online.
- Generative AI is a technologybased tool that can independently create content, like writing or art, on its own.

Information for Parents and Caregivers



What might my child learn about AI in school?

At school, your child will learn about digital literacy, digital tools, and how to use tech safely and responsibly.

Understanding AI is important in today's world. Teachers will have different ways to share this learning with your child. Most learning is covered in two parts of the curriculum: Career Education and Applied Design, Skills, and Technology. In these subjects, your child will learn to make sure the information they find, and use is reliable. There are other subjects that may also build your child's digital skills. Your child may learn about how digital tools work, how computers make decisions, and how issues like fairness, privacy, and ethics are part of staying safe online. Learning about AI can help students make informed choices about when they may want, or not want, to use AI tools.

Will AI tools be used in my child's school?

Whether or not Al tools are used in your child's school will vary from classroom to classroom. Some teachers may use Al tools in different ways to support learning. If your child has a disability or diverse ability, it may be decided that an Al tool can be used to support them. If you're curious about how and when Al tools are used in your child's classroom, ask your child's teacher or principal for more information.

When it comes to assignments, some teachers may allow students to use Al tools for specific tasks. However, it's important for students to ask their teachers for permission and guidance before using Al tools in their work. Just like a calculator can be a helpful tool in mathematics, Al may be another kind of tool used in some classrooms.

How can I encourage safe and responsible use of technology at home?

Al has elements that parents and caregivers should know about, just like with any other digital tool. Privacy is important—and knowing how Al uses personal data, where it's kept, and who gets to see it is the best way to protect your privacy. Sometimes, Al can be biased, unfair, and inaccurate. It's important to be aware of this so you can spot it and help your child do the same.

It's also important to grow your child's digital literacy skills. While teachers will provide some of these learning opportunities at school, if your child is using digital tools, it's equally important to strengthen them at home.

Why is digital literacy important to my child's learning?

Digital literacy goes beyond just knowing about Al; it's about using all tech wisely. If your child uses digital tools, they should know how to search the internet and to make sure what they find is reliable. They'll also need digital literacy skills to create and share information safely, protect their personal details, use social media wisely, and communicate responsibly. Learning these skills now will help your child make smart choices both online and offline.

How can I support my child's learning at home?

To help your child use digital tools, which could include AI, safely and responsibly, you can develop their digital literacy skills at home. Here are a few key skills you may want to encourage with your child at home:

- Keeping personal information (like name, age, and address) private online
- Using the internet safely and avoiding websites they should not access
- Recognizing and avoiding online scams
- Knowing what to do when they see something upsafe online
- Thinking about possible effects before sharing online
- Thinking carefully about what they see online and understanding that AI can change pictures, videos, audio recordings, and words
- Knowing that Al tools might make mistakes or be biased, unfair, and inaccurate
- Understanding that using other people's work without permission (plagiarism) is not okay
- Mentioning where they sourced information from if they used AI tools for their schoolwork

Student Guidelines for Safe Use of Artificial Intelligence (AI)



Protect Your Privacy

When at school, use AI tools that are approved by your school or trusted adults. Be aware of how your data is used. Do not enter personal details like full name, address, phone number, or school name into AI systems.

(CoPilot is currently district approved)

Understand AI Bias and Verify Responses

AI tools can sometimes give biased or inaccurate information. This happens because AI systems are trained on data, which may not always be fair, accurate or inclusive. Always verify information from other reliable sources - especially if it seems inaccurate.





AI is a Learning Companion

Use AI tools to support your learning - do not let these tools do the thinking for you. AI can help with research, provide suggestions, or check your work, however, your critical thinking and creativity are essential. Use of AI to cheat will restrict your learning.

Create Specific Prompts

A good AI question is clear, specific and provides enough detail to guide the AI in generating a response. If the response is not sufficient, ask follow-up questions to the AI to refine the output.





Ask for Help

If you're not sure how to use an AI tool or if you're worried about how it works, talk to a teacher or an adult you trust. They can guide you in using AI safely and responsibly.

Keep Learning About AI

AI is a powerful tool that is constantly evolving. Keep learning about how it works and stay informed on the latest developments so you can use it safely and effectively.



Dear educators, parents, caregivers, and community members,

My name is Danny Lybbert, and I am the Program Manager at Out In Schools. We are part of Out On Screen, a non-profit organization based in Vancouver that celebrates queer, trans, and Two-Spirit lives through film and dialogue. Out In Schools offers developmentally appropriate conversations about 2SLBGTQIA+ people to students, teachers, and beyond. We hope to join you in maintaining school communities that are inclusive of all students and families.

Out In Schools is built on a strong understanding of the Ministry of Education's approach to sexual orientation and gender identity (SOGI). This approach was introduced in response to changes to the BC Human Rights Code in 2016. At its core, the goal of SOGI is to ensure every student is valued and included, and that no one is discriminated against because of their sexual orientation or gender identity.

Our presentations introduce students to a diverse spectrum of identities. We will pair our content with short films and facilitated discussions to help illustrate ideas and share stories of people with lived experiences. You can expect our session to cover the following content:

- ï Recognizing sexual orientations and gender identities within and beyond the 2SLGBTQIA+ acronym, including gueer, transgender, straight, and cisgender.

YOUNG AUTHORS' CONFERENCE 2025 Student Information

The Young Authors' Conference, sponsored by the Cowichan Valley School District, will take place Thursday, May 1, 2025 at Vancouver Island University in Duncan and at Quw'utsun Secondary School next door.

At this conference, students will have an opportunity to attend one morning and one afternoon session with two different published authors. In these sessions, the authors will comment on the students' writing and also lead some writing activities. We would like to encourage any students who would benefit from this experience to submit two scripts and a student questionnaire form to the school contact person. Scripts by our definition are two polished pieces of original student writing (not Al generated) which may be from any of the following genres:

- Poetry
- Short story
- Essay
- Fictional journal writing
- Graphic novel/cartoon story (1-2 8 ½" x 11")
- A non-fiction article or newspaper article

Both submitted scripts from each student MUST conform to the following and be in the format in which they will be published (nothing handwritten is acceptable)

- Typewritten, single-sided, **5 copies** of each script. Two of these copies will be submitted to the authors, and the others will be bound into student anthologies
- Double spaced with margins on all sides to allow space for author feedback
- Student name and school to be put on the bottom of every page
- No more than 4 pages of writing in total per student additional pages will not be used
- Use size 12 plain font (like Arial or Times New Roman, not fancy fonts)
- Do not staple just paper clip
